Jesper Parnevik....With His Victory:

- Wins his first victory on PGA TOUR Champions and it comes in his 23rd start on Tour.
- Earns a check for \$315,000, and moves into fourth place in the season-long Charles Schwab Cup race with \$471,071.
- He earns a two-year exemption into the season-opening Mitsubishi Electric Championship at Hualalai in Hawaii.
- Wins his second event in Texas...he also won the 2000 GTE Byron Nelson Classic in a playoff with Phil Mickelson and Davis Love III.
- The win was his first in a TOUR event since he claimed the 2001 Honda Classic, a span of 15 years, 1 month and 27 days.
- The win came in his 277th start on Tour since his victory at the Honda Classic.
- Becomes the 7th different winner on Tour this year and the first first-time winner.
- Is the 7th international player to win this event and fourth in a row.

Round Three Notes:

Jesper Parnevik was the only player in the field to post three consecutive rounds in the 60s and his 54hole score of 12-under-par 204 was the best score by a champion since 2012 when Fred Funk finished at 14-under-par 202. Jesper Parnevik's four-stroke victory was the largest since Fred Couples won by seven strokes in 2010.

John Daly finished T17 in his PGA TOUR Champions debut, closing with a 1-under-par 71. After making birdies on four of his first six holes, Daly played his final 12 holes in 3-over-par, including a costly triple bogey at No. 17. He finished with a 54-hole total of 2-under-par 214.

John Daly on his play this week:

"It was a solid week and I played better than I thought I would. I hit a lot of fairways this week. The irons weren't all that great. I was really close to being good. But for not playing, I'm pretty pleased. I'll just go home this week and work on the things I need to work on. My short and middle irons -- my middle irons were actually pretty good. My 7-, 8-, and 9-irons were the ones that really hurt me today."

Mike Goodes finished as a runner-up in this event for the second time in last four years when he was one of three players along with Jeff Maggert and David Frost to finish four strokes behind Jesper Parnevik. Goodes and Gene Sauers were second to Esteban Toledo in 2013.

Jeff Maggert's bid to win the event just minutes from his home in The Woodlands fell short as he was among three players finishing four back of Jesper Parnevik. Maggert led by two strokes after birdies on the first two holes, but he was able to make just one birdie over his final 16 holes.

Kirk Triplett had a nice comeback following his 3-over-par 75 on Friday. Triplett posted rounds of 69 and 66 on the weekend to finish T7 after being T53 after Friday's first round.

Todd Hamilton made the fourth hole-in-one in tournament history on Sunday and the third on Tour this year. His ace came at No. 3 with an 8-iron from 135 yards. The others to make a hole-in-one at this tournament were **J.L. Lewis** (No. 16/2012/R1), **Tom Kite** (No. 16/2013/R1) and **Dan Forsman** (No. 8/2015/1st Rd.). It was Hamilton's first on PGA TOUR Champions. He did not have one on the PGA TOUR.

Defending champion Ian Woosnam finished T50.

Billy Andrade and Duffy Waldorf led all players with 17 birdies.

Hole No. 14 emerged as the most difficult for the event with an average score of 3.382 (+/.382). The easiest was No. 15 with an average score of 4.636 (-364).

The field average was 73.048 for the tournament and it was a bit higher than a year ago when the field averaged 72.376.

What They Said:

David Frost, on turning it around on the back nine on Sunday:

"I was kind of struggling on the front nine, and David Graham gave me a little pointer the other day on my grip, and I kept checking my grip out before I hit the ball, and I found that I was crouching, looking at my grip all the time. And even on 10. And I got to the 11th tee box and I thought, 'My swing isn't bad, there is nothing wrong with it. I think I'm just looking at this grip too long.' So I raised my chin up to give myself some room to swing my arms under my chin, by just raising my head, and I just played great golf the last eight holes. You know, but I'm sure there will be something else next week."

Jeff Maggert, on whether he feels extra pressure playing at his home course at The Woodlands:

"I wouldn't say it is any different. I would say it's easier to play well here just because I'm a lot more comfortable, but it's the same focus -- you know, trying to play well and trying to win. It's a good week. This was the best, really, I played all year. I had a couple up and down tournaments this year, you know, finishing in the top 10, but not really up near the lead."

Mike Goodes, on his performance on Sunday:

"I played very good all day. You know, I did what I wanted to do. I drove the ball good. I gave myself a lot of chances for birdies and made a lot of birdies. I just made some bogeys and a double -- but I have no regrets. Jesper played great golf today. He played great golf."
